Remembering Bishop John K. Yambasu

We join the Sierra Leone Conference and the entire UMC in mourning the untimely death of Bishop John K. Yambasu in August. Bishop Yambasu was a faithful advocate for Central Conference Pensions and worked with CCP staff to establish the Sierra Leone pension plan. Paul Dirdak, retired Central Conference Pension Administration Director and CCP consultant, knew Bishop Yambasu well and offered this reflection:

"Before John Yambasu was a Bishop, he was a child advocate ... He advocated for the children—those whose hands had been severed to 'win' a war and those who had been conscripted into armies to bear AK-47s about as tall as they were. John was a child advocate in the midst of that. What's not to admire?"



Paul went on to say that

while Bishop Yambasu was elected to important, public roles in the UMC and broader ecumenical community, "his greatest contributions were quiet, behind the scenes, for the sake of his church's sustainability. He hired better lawyers, better treasurers, better staff supervisors and he cared for those who labored in his institution, for all of their basic health and safety and welfare. His public profile was still growing when he died, but his greater accomplishment was the stronger, more capable church that survives him."

Bishop Yambasu's own words and witness continue to remind us of the importance and impact of the CCP program:

"In my many years as clergy and a missionary in Africa, I have lived to see retired pastors die in abject poverty and without dignity. I have seen many young people shy away from full-time itinerant ministry because it was like intentionally signing on for a life of permanent poverty. Through the Central Conference Pensions, you and your colleagues restored dignity to ordained ministry. Today in Africa, we celebrate the lives of the many young people who now see ordained ministry as a vocation worth pursuing. And, we continue to see retired pastors live healthier and longer—and with dignity."

Experiencing Great Loss—Patience's Story of Strength

In the midst of the global pandemic, we share with you a story of strength and survival from Kenya.

Patience Mbeyu Nguta-Kathengi, United Methodist pastor and mother of three, was already suffering loss when the COVID-19 pandemic swept across the globe. In 2012 she lost her eyesight while pregnant with her third child, and her world changed forever.

Although blindness left Patience unable to provide for her family in the same way, pension benefits from her years of service at the United Methodist Church—Tazama Christ, through the East Africa pension plan funded by CCP, allowed her some continued support.

Then in April, tragedy struck again when Patience's husband passed away from COVID-19. Prior to his passing, he had worked as a night guard, helping to support the family. His death is yet another reminder that the impacts of COVID-19 are especially devastating for many already-disadvantaged populations across the globe.

While Patience is incredibly grateful for the benefits she continues to receive from the CCP program, her family's loss is deep. She continues to look for support from her neighbors and others.



Life took a painful twist in 2012 when I lost my sight while expectant. I had to depend on my husband for survival and my children for moral support. My church ... and Pastor Rev. Mudiri have been of great help too. I thank them for praying for me and my family. To date, I survive on the pension I receive from Wespath.

Wespath Engages Thomas Kemper to Support CCP

Wespath is pleased to announce that Thomas Kemper will be a consultant in support of CCP and central conference relationships effective January 1, 2021.

Thomas recently retired as general secretary of the General Board of Global Ministries. He brings to Wespath's CCP team extensive experience with the central conferences, coupled with strong

relationships across the Church. Thomas's primary focus will be bolstering the long-term sustainability of pension plans in the central conferences. His work will include consulting with central conference bishops, conference leaders and boards of pensions to assist them in addressing pension program challenges and opportunities, including the systems and structures in which the plans operate.

"We are delighted to have Thomas join us in a consulting capacity," said Barbara Boigegrain, Wespath general secretary. "He will be a valuable resource as we continue to build and maintain critical relationships important for CCP success and effective support of non-U.S. pensions."

In October, Thomas spent three days at Wespath's headquarters with the CCP team getting oriented to central conference pensions work. We are extremely grateful Thomas will continue his long service to the Church by working as a consultant for the CCP program.

Meetings Move Online During the Pandemic

As the pandemic continues to restrict travel and in-person gatherings, Central Conference benefits personnel are using virtual meetings to continue their work.

Philippines—In October, the Philippines central conference (PCC) Board of Pensions met via Zoom, allowing them to conduct an opening worship and address business matters. The Board learned that as a result of limited access to technology and internet, many congregations in the Philippines have been unable to worship virtually, resulting in pension plan contributions dropping off dramatically. This underscores the financial damage caused by the pandemic, and further highlights the importance of the Board's additional fund-raising efforts.

East Africa—Benefits officers from each of the four conferences in the East Africa Episcopal Area met by videoconference in August. Highlights of the discussion included:

- QuickBooks training progress and working through challenges for pension plan recordkeeping
- Updates regarding the transition of pension distributions from a third-party administrator to the UMC benefits officers
- Added administrative costs related to assuming responsibility for pension payment distributions
- Adverse impacts of COVID-19 on contributions to the pension program

Wespath's CCP team—We continue to use videoconferencing to connect with central conference benefits officers and expect this to continue well into 2021.
